Hometown Reconstruction Support Event led by Iwate-born baseball players Yuusei Kikuchi and Shohei Otani

On Saturday, December 28, 2013, Hanamaki Higashi High School alumni Yuusei Kikuchi (Saitama Seibu Lions) and Shohei Otani (Hokkaido Nippon Ham Fighters) led a Hometown Reconstruction Support Event organized by Hanamaki City. The two professional baseball players held the event at the Hanamaki Gymnasium Annex, with around 3,000 townspeople and youth baseball players in attendance.

The event was "to repay Iwate Prefecture, the land where we were raised. We hope this raises the spirits of the children of the coast," said the two players. Hanamaki City and others were in full agreement and helped organize the event.

At the event, Kikuchi taught pitching, and Otani taught batting. At a talk show panel following, the two players recalled their first face-off and the All Star games, to the delight of the people in the hall.

Fourteen elementary and middle school baseball teams (around 270 players) were invited from Kamaishi and Ofunato, which were hit by the great tsunami. They all received bat sleeves and ball cases from Kikuchi and Otani.

"I'll never forget what you taught me. I want to become a player who gives people dreams and hope," said Kaito Yano, the captain of the Unosumai Baseball Sports Club of Kamaishi City, his eyes bright as he spoke to Kikuchi and Otani.

The prefectural government reports on the status of its major initiatives and projects on its homepage under the three principles outlined in its Reconstruction Implementation Plan ("Ensuring safety," "Rebuilding lives," and "Rebooting industries").

Some of the projects reported on are the "Emergency Disposal of Disaster Waste (Debris Removal)" under the Safety principle, the "Construction of Public Housing for Disaster Survivors" under the Lives principle, and the "Cooperative Use of Fishing Boats and Other

Recovery Support Measures" under the Industry principle. Iwate Prefecture picks some of the major initiatives throughout the 395 projects listed in the 1st phase of the Reconstruction Implementation Plan, and reports easy-to-read data on their progress. Reports are published monthly (updates around the end or beginning of the month)

Opinion exchange held to gain the perspective of women and young people for the 2nd phase of the Reconstruction Implementation Plan

As lwate Prefecture attempts to step up to full gear of its reconstruction from the earthquake and tsunami, we need to actively gather opinions from young people and women as we establish policies for the 2nd phase of the Reconstruction Implementation Plan (lasting from 2014 to 2016). Opinion exchanges were held with both women and young people for this purpose.

On Tuesday, January 7, an opinion exchange with young people was held at the prefectural office, with 10 young men and women in attendance. These 20- to 30-somethings are involved with reconstruction efforts throughout lwate.

"You need exciting and fun projects in order to involve women and young people," said Shoma Okamoto. There were many more ideas from the rest of the members showcasing a youth perspective.

Then, on Thursday, January 9, an opinion exchange with women was held at the hotel Espoir Iwate. In attendance were eleven women involved with Iwate organizations and businesses.

These exchanges were places where members could reflect on suggestions given at exchanges held in July 2013, as well as draft ideas for the 2^{nd} phase of the Reconstruction Implementation Plan.

"I learned a lot by hearing about future plans and projections from the prefecture officials, and by listening to the opinions of many others. It was nice to give my own opinion as well," said Toshiko Saga, the principal of Yamada Minami Elementary School of Yamada Town.

The prefecture will conduct regional seminars from January 28 (Tue) to February 10 (Mon) on the 1st draft of the 2nd Phase of the Reconstruction Implementation Plan. Not only will they receive the opinions of many people, they will hold a public comment session. The plan will be finalized in the end of March.

Comment from Hashimoto: "Come to Sanriku – Enjoy my beloved Sanriku Railway!" the Sanriku Railway. As a high schooler, he works part time during breaks at the Sanriku Railway Sakari Station Exchange and Waiting Room run by the NPO Yume Net Ofunato.

"Tourism has been increasing since the Sanriku Railway restarted operations. It's fun talking to tourists, and I think they energize the area," says Hashimoto, talking excitedly about his home, the Ofunato region.

Hoping for the quick reconstruction of the railroads

The Sanriku Railway is not due to be completely reconstructed until April 2014. During this time, the JR Ofunato Line has temporarily recovered by using a BRT (bus rapid transit) system and the JR Yamada Line is borrowing buses from a bus company to transport passengers.

Knowing this, "Trains have become a precious resource in transporting people from town to town," says Hashimoto, hoping for the restoration of the line. "I think people feel reluctant to visit because it's a disaster-affected area, but I would love for lots of tourists to visit. Please come and enjoy Sanriku, and create happy memories here," he said, hoping for the restoration of tourism to Sanriku and a quick reconstruction of the Sanriku Railway.
