We are deeply grateful for the heartwarming encouragement and support received from both within and outside of Japan in the aftermath of the Great East Japan Earthquake and Tsunami, which struck on March 11, 2011. The precious bonds created during this time will always be cherished.

Winter is upon us here in Iwate; light falls of snow have begun, and most days have a minimum temperature below 0. Sanriku Railway's "Kotatsu Train", which used to run during the winter season before last year's disaster, will be revived this winter. Groundbreaking on the Sanriku Coast Road

November 18 saw the Groundbreaking Ceremony for the Sanriku Coast Road (Miyako Central-Taro Section). Work was expected to take 4 years after its initial proposal, but thankfully it was started within a year. Construction on the Sanriku Coast Road, which was only proposed after the disaster, has now truly begun. November 8's ceremony included breaking-in the shovels for the project, and praying for the project's speedy conclusion and for the safety of the workers.

Trans-Tohoku Expressway Grand Opening

The Opening Ceremony for the Trans-Tohoku Expressway Kamaishi-Akita Line (Miyamori IC-Towa IC Section) took place on November 25. This marks the first full opening of a "Reconstruction Road" to public use.

The new road is expected to shorten the time to travel between inland areas that the Kamaishi-Ofunato area, as well as improve the efficiency of transportation of goods and emergency medical services. It is also hoped that the road will help strengthen countermeasures in the event of future disasters.

This marks a major step forward in our reconstruction.

Greenhouse-Production

Agriland Takata, a tomato-growing agricultural production firm based in Rikuzen-Takata City, lost its plastic greenhouse and 1.3 hectares worth of farmland in the tsunami.

Now, though, they have borrowed an unused greenhouse in the relatively undamaged Yokota area, and have started cultivating mini-tomatoes. They are also producing strawberries. This year saw the rebuilding of 10 greenhouses, and before long Agriland will be able to deliver "Reconstruction Strawberries" around Japan.

Iwate has published Volume 4 of its "Iwate Reconstruction Index Report". The report is one of the tools used to monitor the progress of Iwate's reconstruction plan.

The Reconstruction Index catalogues representative data regarding the current status and changes in Iwate's reconstruction and restoration efforts. The data are categorized under 26 topics. The updated index has been published every three months, starting from February 2012.

Dismantling with the goal of restoring the Kamaishi Line's steam locomotive

Dismantling of an old steam locomotive began on November 26. The train had been on display in the "traffic park" in Morioka's sports park. The parts, which will take around a week to dismantle, will then be transported to the Omiya General Vehicle Center near the Railway Museum in Saitama city, where they will be restored. Restoration is expected to finish around December 2013, and the train will be running on the JR Kamaishi Line on weekends and holidays in the spring of 2014.



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
