New Years Celebrations have even Continued since before the Disaster

On January 13 Miyako City held its "Salmon Festa". It has replaced the former "Sake Matsuri" that was held on January 3 until the disaster. Even with the disaster, the festival was held at the same time last year, and visitors engaged in rice-bun throwing (mochimaki, left photo) and

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a salmon-catching game (sake no tsukami dori), which took place in a specially-built water tank (right photo). The Miyako Fisheries High School also performed taiko drumming (Miya Sui Daiko).

All of the affected areas entered the New Year with a spirit of strong resolve to make this a year where we move forward with the foundation of the reconstruction.



Supporting the Reconstruction with Design

Because of the destruction caused to local industries in coastal areas, it became a challenge to handle even the designs for packaging. This is where the Iwate Design Network Volunteers or "i-DNet" came in. They were formed by four entities including the Iwate Industrial Technology Junior College, hoping to aid the reconstruction through the ideas of industrial design students.

Information for Disaster Survivors

The application period for support money for rebuilding survivors' lives (basic support money) has been extended

The "support money for rebuilding survivors' lives" system is a Japanese government initiative providing emergency aid to those who lost their homes or otherwise suffered greatly in the disaster.

The deadline to apply for the basic support money has now been extended to 37 months from the day of the disaster, or April 10, 2014.

Please consult with the municipal office of the area in which you were resident at the time of the disaster.
