Construction Starts on Mass Relocation Sites in Kuji City

Many people in Japan have now heard of Kuji City through the broadcast of the NHK serial drama, "Ama-chan," which takes place in the city. On Thursday, April 18, construction started on mass relocation sites within the city as part of the Disaster Prevention in Fishing Settlements Initiative. There was also a ceremony held to pray for the safety of the project.

The construction will be in the Tamanowaki and Kuki districts, and are the first places where construction has started in the city. Even though Kuji is located on the northern end of lwate's coast, it still took immense damage from the earthquake and tsunami, and many area residents need to be relocated to higher ground. This construction project will create residential districts on higher ground, and is planned to be

completed by the end of August of this year. Public housing for disaster victims and private housing will be built once construction ends.

Real steps of the reconstruction are being taken right before our eyes.

Meeting for the Reconstruction Headquarters Council

The first Iwate Reconstruction Headquarters Council Meeting of the fiscal year was held on Tuesday, April 30.

This council decides the direction of Iwate's reconstruction measures and policies, and Governor Tasso sits at the head of the organization. The following topics were discussed and authorized at the meeting: "Current State of the Initiatives of the Reconstruction," "Status Report of Policies and Projects of

the Reconstruction Implementation Plan," "Revision of Phase 1 of the Reconstruction Implementation Plan," "Results of the



Results of the 2013 Reconstruction Awareness Survey

On Tuesday, April 30, the results of the 2013 "Awareness Survey Regarding Iwate Prefecture's Reconstruction from the Great East Japan Earthquake and Tsunami" (from hereon, "Awareness Survey") were published. The survey took place from February to March 2013, and these are the preliminary findings. The survey was outlined in the Reconstruction Plan created in August 2011, and asks how prefectural citizens feel about the status and progression of reconstruction measures, policies, and projects, and also gauges how much is known among the general public about the restoration and reconstruction. It is conducted once a year.

Within the results, there was an increase of 12.6 percentage points from last year among responders who indicated that they feel that the reconstruction of the prefecture as a whole is not progressing as fast as it should. However, most of the other questions saw very few changes in their answers.
