We are deeply grateful for the heart-warming encouragement and support received from both within and outside of Japan in the aftermath of the Great East Japan Earthquake and the Tsunami, which struck on March 11, 2011. We will continue to cherish these bonds.

More than 24,000 homes in Iwate were lost in the disaster, and even though a year and four months has passed, there are still around 17,000 families that have no choice but to live in emergency temporary housing.

We bring you news of our steady journey to reconstruction and the restoration of our homeland, Iwate and Sanriku.

Public Housing for Survivors – Ground-breaking Ceremony in Kamaishi

A ground-breaking ceremony for public housing for survivors was held on June 14 in the Heita district of Kamaishi City on the former site of the Kamaishi Vocational High School. This is the first public housing construction project to be started in the prefecture.

Parliamentary Secretary Tsukawa of the Reconstruction Agency, Kamaishi Mayor Noda, and Governor Tasso attended the event where they prayed for the safety of the project and performed a ceremonial ground-breaking.



After the former school building on the site is demolished, construction will start on public housing. The 7-story reinforced concrete structure (with 126 apartments) is planned to be finished in autumn of next year (2013).

Cooperating with local municipalities, Iwate plans to build around 5,300 public housing apartments for disaster survivors.

This ground-breaking ceremony is the first shot at that project, and a large step towards the reconstruction of housing in the disaster-stricken coastal region of Sanriku.

This is part of the "Rebuilding Lives" pillar of our reconstruction plan, which is an all out effort to provide housing based on regional community planning plans, so that the survivors regain a sense of hope and can remain in their homelands.

- OBuildings destroyed (residences only, fully/partially damaged): 24,877

Nurses - Our Hearts Are With You

There are 16,000 nursing personnel working in medical organizations and welfare facilities throughout Iwate.

"I saw how important the role of nurses was during the disaster. Nurses are the staff closest to the patients, and take care of both their health and their mental wellbeing. I'm proud to be a nurse," said Tomiko Onodera, chief nurse at the Daito Prefectural Hospital.

Reissuing diplomas for survivors who are alumni of prefectural high school or special support schools

The Prefectural Board of Education will reissue diplomas at no cost for survivors who are alumni of prefectural schools who lost their diplomas in the tsunami.

Application period: Until August 20, 2012 (Mon)

Necessary documents:

- Reissue Application (provided by the school)
- Copy of your disaster-survivor certificate
- Identification
- (If you cannot go personally) An authorization letter for your representative or document proving their relationship to you

We hope this will be of help to survivors who lost precious items in the tsunami.



The One-Year Anniversary of Hiraizumi's Inscription as a World Heritage Site

Hiraizumi was anointed a World Heritage Site almost immediately following the Great East Japan Earthquake and Tsunami, and was a bright point in a rather dark time. Let's look back on the past year.



World Heritage HIRAIZUMI 2011

[...] will give great encouragement to us who currently face the overwhelming task of recovery from the March 11 disaster, with the initial ideals of the construction of Hiraizumi in mind." (Excerpt) "The Hiraizumi Declaration on the Tohoku Restoration" was published, and on the three-day weekend, twice July, 2011 as many (4,000) visitors came to Hiraizumi as in the previous year. Hiraizumi stamp sheets limited to Iwate were sold by the post office and sold out in a single day. October, 2011 Hiraizumi was promoted at a Japan event held in Paris, France. April, 2012 Held for the first time in 2 years, the Fujiwara Spring Festival in Hiraizumi saw Governor Tasso playing the role May, 2012 of Fujiwara no Hidehira, the third lord of Hiraizumi.

> During Golden Week, **375,000 visitors** traveled to Hiraizumi, **a 15% increase** from 2010. A commemorative ¥1000 coin for Iwate was minted for the 60th anniversary of the Local Government Act. The coin's design of Hiraizumi won the Most Beautiful Coin award at the Mint Directors Conference's Coin Competition. The Iwate University Centre for Hiraizumi Studies was opened.

We are now working to get the Yanagi-no-Gosho Site (former palace ruins) to be inscribed within the Hiraizumi World Heritage Site. Hiraizumi shall continue to give us strength as we walk the path to reconstruction.
